


Snake River Jr. High School



Snake River High School was represented at H.O.S.A. State (Health Occupations Students of America) from April 11th-13th by 7 students: Latimer High, Kassi Munro, Abby Apolonio, Saige Dally, Alex VanOrden, Austin Apolonio, and Lexi Baron. These students competed in many varying events. Austin competed in Researched Persuasive Writing and Speaking. His paper on Gene Editing got him into the second round of competition where he was able to give a speech on the same topic. Kassi and Abby competed in CPR/First Aid to test the skills they are learning in a local EMT class at Blackfoot's Fire Station. They were also able to pass the first round of knowledge based information and compete with hands on skills in the second round. Alex, Latimer, Kassi, and Abby competed in PSA (Public Service Announcement) where they created a 30 second advertisement about the risks of Prediabetes and how to get help. Their PSA made it past the first round and in the second round they had to defend their advertisement in 4 minutes, including what they learned on the subject and how they created the video. When winners were announced at H.O.S.A.'s closing ceremony Alex, Latimer, Kassi, and Abby received first place for their outstanding PSA. Shocked and excited they each accepted their gold medals with the knowledge that they will be able to compete at Nationals. Nationals are held in Dallas, Texas this year from June 25-29th. These four students will be raising money to help fund their trip to Dallas. During the closing ceremony, Denise Aikele received a plaque honoring her 20 years of service in the H.O.S.A. organization which was a huge, well deserved honor for all of her hard work. Overall, this was a wonderful experience for each of Snake Rivers H.O.S.A. club. Everyone got to learn and compete at healthy levels that allowed them all to grow.
