## **SNAKE RIVER HIGH SCHOOL BAND**

Highlights from the band this last month are: January 23--Pepsi announces Snake River Bands as an official recipient of a \$25,000 grant. They placed 7th overall out of 224 total grant proposals nationwide. January 26--Century Link announces Mr. Brady as an official recipient of an \$8,466 grant for technology. The Snake River Band was one of twelve recipients statewide out of 108 applicants.
